



  - The Free Software Definition (from GNU / the FSF; a.k.a. "The Four Freedoms")<sup>1</sup>
  - Debian Free Software Guidelines<sup>2</sup>
  - **The Open Source Definition** (from the OSI)<sup>3</sup>
- $\Rightarrow$  The license must grant the user certain rights.

## What Makes A License "Open Source"?



#### Free Software Definition<sup>4</sup>

- 0. The Freedom to run the program as you wish, for any purpose.
- 1. The Freedom to study how the program works, and change it so it does your computing as you wish.
- 2. The freedom to redistribute copies so you can help others.
- 3. The freedom to distribute copies of your modified versions to others.

#### **Open Source Definition<sup>5</sup>**

- 1. Free Redistribution
- 2. [Program must include] Source Code
- 3. Derived Works [can be published]
- 4. Integrity of The Author's Source Code
- 5. No Discrimination Against Persons or Groups
- 6. No Discrimination Against Fields of Endeavor
- 7. Distribution of License
- 8. License Must Not Be Specific to a Product
- 9. License Must Not Restrict Other Software
- 10. License Must Be Technology-Neutral

### The 2-Clause BSD License<sup>6</sup>

## **A Possible Problem**



- Vou publish a program under one of the aforementioned licenses.
- Somebody else improves your program but then decides to distribute it under a proprietary license.
- $\Rightarrow$  People can run off with your source code without any guarantee that it will remain open source.

- The **GNU Gerneal Public Licence (GPL)**<sup>9</sup> is the most widley adopted copyleft license.

### Incompatible Copyleft Licenses

- ZFS in Linux<sup>12</sup>
- ⇒ When choosing a copyleft license for your own project, always use the GPL (or a compatible license).

## **Contributor License Agreements (CLAs)**



- Some projects would like to retain the ability to change the license of program.
- Contributors must sign a Contributor License Agreement (CLA) before they can contribute.
- $\Rightarrow$  It's up to you if you want to do this.

## **Public Domain: The Easy Option**




Instead of retaining copyright and using a license, one can also release the program into the public domain.

## **Public Domain: The Easy Option**



- Instead of retaining copyright and using a license, one can also release the program into the public domain.
- ⇒ The CC0 dedication<sup>13</sup> allows you to waive your copyright to the extent permissible by law.
