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


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## What makes a license "Open Source"?

#### What Makes A License "Open Source"?



- Multiple definitions exist (some of them based on one another).
  - ☐ The Free Software Definition (from GNU / the FSF; a.k.a. "The Four Freedoms")¹
  - □ Debian Free Software Guidelines<sup>2</sup>
  - ☐ The Open Source Definition (from the OSI)<sup>3</sup>

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  - ☐ The Open Source Definition (from the OSI)<sup>3</sup>
- ⇒ The license must grant the user certain rights.

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#### What Makes A License "Open Source"?



#### Free Software Definition<sup>4</sup>

- The Freedom to run the program as you wish, for any purpose.
- The Freedom to study how the program works, and change it so it does your computing as you wish.
- The freedom to redistribute copies so you can help others.
- The freedom to distribute copies of your modified versions to others.

#### Open Source Definition<sup>5</sup>

- 1. Free Redistribution
- 2. [Program must include] Source Code
- Derived Works [can be published]
- 4. Integrity of The Author's Source Code
- 5. No Discrimination Against Persons or Groups
- 6. No Discrimination Against Fields of Endeavor
- Distribution of License
- 8. License Must Not Be Specific to a Product
- 9. License Must Not Restrict Other Software
- License Must Be Technology-Neutral

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Let's take a look at some Licenses!

#### The 2-Clause BSD License<sup>6</sup>



Copyright <YEAR> <COPYRIGHT HOLDER>

Redistribution and use in source and binary forms, with or without modification, are permitted provided that the following conditions are met:

- 1. Redistributions of source code must retain the above copyright notice, this list of conditions and the following disclaimer.
- 2. Redistributions in binary form must reproduce the above copyright notice, this list of conditions and the following disclaimer in the documentation and/or other materials provided with the distribution.

### The MIT License (a.k.a. "The Expat License")7



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The above copyright notice and this permission notice shall be included in all copies or substantial portions of the Software.

#### **Apache License 2.0**<sup>8</sup>



■ Similar to BSD and MIT licenses, but with an extra clause against patent treachery.

#### Apache License 2.08



- Similar to BSD and MIT licenses, but with an extra clause against patent treachery.
- [...] 3. Grant of Patent License. Subject to the terms and conditions of this License, each Contributor hereby grants to You a perpetual, worldwide, non-exclusive, no-charge, royalty-free, irrevocable (except as stated in this section) patent license to make, have made, use, offer to sell, sell, import, and otherwise transfer the Work, where such license applies only to those patent claims licensable by such Contributor that are necessarily infringed by their Contribution(s) alone or by combination of their Contribution(s) with the Work to which such Contribution(s) was submitted. If You institute patent litigation against any entity (including a cross-claim or counterclaim in a lawsuit) alleging that the Work or a Contribution incorporated within the Work constitutes direct or contributory patent infringement, then any patent licenses granted to You under this License for that Work shall terminate as of the date such litigation is filed. [...]

#### **A Possible Problem**



You publish a program under one of the aforementioned licenses.

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- You publish a program under one of the aforementioned licenses.
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- You publish a program under one of the aforementioned licenses.
- Somebody else improves your program but then decides to distribute it under a proprietary license.
- ⇒ People can run off with your source code without any guarantee that it will remain open source.



Copyleft licenses demand that the program can only be redistributed under the same license.

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- The GNU Gerneal Public Licence (GPL)9 is the most widley adopted copyleft license.

  - ☐ Programs that link to a GPL-licensed library will also have to use the same license.
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  - ☐ ZES in Linux<sup>12</sup>





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  - ☐ ZFS in Linux<sup>12</sup>
  - ⇒ When choosing a copyleft license for your own project, always use the GPL (or a compatible license).





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
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- ⇒ The CC0 dedication<sup>13</sup> allows you to waive your copyright to the extent permissible by law.
